The National Trust geology and geological collecting policies have now been signed off. The final available via the Nature pages (under Geology) of our www.nationaltrust.org.uk. Simon Ford and I would like to thank you all for your very helpful contributions. We would like to remind you that these policies were produced in response to an operational need identified in Wessex. They bring together the Trust's past discussions, papers and reports on this subject into two documents that acknowledge our magnificent geological resource and set out our position and our approach to its promotion and conservation. Importantly, they draw on or make some reference to several other relevant internal and external policies and initiatives and are to be implemented along with these, as appropriate. As with all Trust policies they will be reviewed periodically. We know there is a lot of potential and interest (both internally and externally) in promoting our geological resource and engaging more widely with this subject. We hope we can do this through various existing initiatives such as the Trust's wildlife campaign theme 'hidden nature' and external initiatives, such as International Year of Planet Earth, and over time develop stronger links with various geological groups and individuals such as yourselves.

Aggregates Workshops Bid Success

A joint bid from UKRIGS, the GTs and Natural England for ALSF funding has been successful. The Project entitled "Driving Aggregates and LGAPs forward in England" emerged as a follow up to the Survey Questionnaire in which you all participated. The main aims of the project are the support of one-day workshops covering each Government region - sharing good practice including the development of common standards for site management plans (ideally one for each group) for selected aggregates sites. A special funding workshop will be organised later. Project Manager Julie Harrald is currently producing the project plan for Natural England approval. Together with Julie and GT officer Chloe Brooks, Alan Cutler will be helping in the general arrangements and workshop presentations.

Forest of Dean Geomap

The Forest of Dean Local History Society has been awarded a grant by DEFRA's Aggregates Levy Sustainability Fund administered by Natural England, to produce a spectacular piece of sculpture. Geologists are fairly certain that this is a unique project, with certainly nothing like it in the UK, and even in the world. The Geomap will be a 900ft square geology map of the Forest of Dean, sculpted by David Yeates. Instead of bright colours on a piece of paper, the rock strata will be represented by the actual rock types. The public will be able to walk across it and also view it from a high vantage point. Mines, quarries and railways will be marked on the map, and plaques will offer further explanation, celebrating these great industries both of the past and the present in this unique area. As partners, the Forestry Commission, Gloucestershire Geology Trust, Forest of Dean District Council and Coleford MCTI Partnership will all be offering their expertise as the project progresses. The Geomap will be completed by March 2008.

East Anglian RIGS Meeting

GeoSuffolk arranged and hosted a meeting of East Anglian RIGS Groups on 26th May, held at Amberfield School in Nacton, Suffolk. The meeting followed on from the successful inaugural meeting of 2005 and 31 delegates attended, with representatives from Suffolk, Essex, Norfolk and Cambridgeshire. The aims of the meeting were to maintain and further develop links between local RIGS groups, and to demonstrate just some of the wide variety of interests and projects undertaken by GeoSuffolk in the last 24 months. The Proceedings of the meeting will be recorded in Volume 43 (2007) of the Transactions of the Suffolk Naturalists' Society. The morning and early afternoon were devoted to a series of seven excellent thought-provoking and entertaining presentations, including an update on progress with the Suffolk LGAP by Tim Holt-Wilson and 3D mapping of the Ipswich area by officers of the BGS. Most of the afternoon was devoted to a field excursion to Newbourne organised by Bob Markham, assisted by other GeoSuffolk members. Participants examined the geology and landforms of Newbourne Springs (a Suffolk Wildlife Trust Nature Reserve), the building stones of the parish church, and Red Crag in 'The Great Pit'.

Central Wales RIGS Project

Since it was set up in May 2005 under the chairmanship of Dr. Bill Fitches, the Central RIGS Wales group (Regionally Important Geodiversity Sites in Ceredigion and Powys) have identified 135 sites. These sites have been surveyed and recorded, and the reports will be lodged shortly with the planning authorities of Ceredigion and Powys county councils and with landowners. In addition to the site audit, several Public Awareness projects have been undertaken by members of Central Wales RIGS. These projects include leading field excursions in vaious parts of Central Wales, North Wales and the Isle of Man. Presentations have been given to the Cambrian Mountains Society, Mid Wales Geological Society and other amateur groups. This 2-year conservation proiect has been under the chairmanship of Dr W.R. Fitches at Aberystwyth and funded by the Aggregates Sustainability Levy Fund, administered by the Welsh Assembly Government (WAG). The Central Wales RIGS group expects to audit additional sites beyond completion of this project.





Geodiversity and LGAPs review

A MIRO and MIST Aggregate review (reviewing what these two bodies have funded), is being carried out by Peter Scott, David Roche and colleagues at Exeter along with Keith Ambrose of UK-RIGS. It is entitled Recognising and managing geodiversity: a 'state of knowledge' review. The report will contain definitions and the components of geodiversity and how geodiversity is recognised and managed in the UK. As it will cover Geodiversity audits, LGAPs, raising awareness in the community and the value of geodiversity, it will concern RIGS groups. If you would like an input, please contact Peter Scott. We look forward to seeing the findings and recommendations. The forthcoming book by the Geological Society on the History of Geoconservation will most likely cover some of the material in a broader way as this project should be dealing primarily with aggregate quarries.

Launch of West Yorkshire Geology Trust

The event on August 25th made a good start for our renewed efforts to protect West Yorkshire's diverse geology and, equally important, to share it, enabling young and old, visitors and residents, to explore and experience the rocks, fossils and mineral wealth that made the county what it is. It was a well-attended launch, in Otley Civic Centre, for our new geology trust and the Local Geodiversity Action Plan which we are now devising for our county of craggy gritstone, fossil-rich coal measures and magnesian limestone: rocks that formed, respectively, in ancient river deltas, in tropical forests and in dying seas - right here in West Yorkshire.
