ACTION REQUIRED

Barker White Paper Threat

RIGS are protected by policies such as PPS9. However, future RIGS may be threatened by the Planning White Paper due in 'late Spring'.

The Barker report makes recommendations to enable more economical and rapid land planning applications. If economics are considered alone, the environment will surely suffer. See www.hm-treasury.gov.uk, 'independent reviews' for more information on the Barker Review.

RIGS Groups have the opportunity to push the environment higher up the government's agenda, and bring the nascent White Paper some balance.

Three Big Threats are: 1) a pro-development planning system, 2) a review of Green Belt boundaries, and 3) abolishing a critical public consultation stage in the planning application.



UKRIGS Education Project Completed

The final Project Report and Evaluation for the Earth Science On-Site Education Project was completed in March 2007. The project was funded by DEFRA's Aggregates Levy Sustainability Fund, administered by Natural England. Project Managers: John Reynolds and Alan Cutler. Education Officer: Rick Ramsdale.

Between June 2004 and March 2007 the UKRIGS ESO-S educational project succeeded in creating freely available, high quality materials illustrating the Earth science educational possibilities at twelve ex-aggregate, SSSI/RIGS locations across England. These materials are currently being viewed on the website by a growing number of interested parties. Gaps remain in the ESO-S site coverage across England, and there remains the task of monitoring and facilitating the continuing uptake and impact of the project. The report 's recommendations include: continuing support for school staff directly and through the Local Authority and the Learning Outside The Classroom Network, extending the project's geographical coverage and publicity.

Geoconservation Database



NATIONAL

ALSF Funding from Natural England

Deadline for applications is 9am April 16th. Natural England is pleased to announce the launch of the 2007/08 Aggregates Levy Sustainability Fund (ALSF) £5 million pound Grant Scheme. Match-funding of between £5k and £350k will support projects that reduce the effects of aggregate extraction on local communities and the natural environment. The themes are: Landscape and Nature Conservation, Access and Informal Recreation, Communities, Education and Understanding, and Evidence gathering. Projects involving SSSIs or ponds will receive special consideration. For fuller details of the scheme, and to apply, visit www.naturalengland.org.uk /conservation/grants-funding/alsf.

NGAP Workshop, 19th March 2007

About 45 people attended the workshop, funded by Natural England and the University of Chester, to explore the feasibility and development of a National GAP. Short talks were given by key individuals: Introduction and History (Prof. Cynthia Burek), Where We Are Now (Dr. Jonathan Larwood), National GAP (Dr Jac Potter), Local GAPs (Dave Owen from the Cotswolds LGAP) and Action Planning (Elaine Tilson). Much discussion ensued and a general aim was developed. The afternoon was spent exploring the objectives needed and the mechanisms to be developed to drive this forward. It was a very productive meeting.

CONFERENCE REPORT

DEFRA Local Sites Seminar "Taking Forward the Guidance", 25/01/07, **Birmingham Hippodrome**. JRR

About 100 delegates attended, taking forward 'DEFRA's Local Sites: Guidance on their Identification, Selection and Management', published in 2006. Copies of the ten papers presented, are likely to be on www.defra.gov.uk

Taking Forward the Guidance will involve working in partnerships. The idea is that formal 'Local Sites Partnerships' will deal with geological and wildlife aspects of sites. RIGS Groups will be part of these Partnerships! Wildlife Trusts may also be a part.



The Presentations: Julian Claxton [DEFRA] in 'The History behind the Guidance', acknowledged the input of John Reynolds of "uck"-RIGS, which caused a few chuckles at the back. Colin Prosser[Natural England] with David Knight, exhorted the importance of the geological

background to all nature conservation in 'Setting the Context'. For the snooze session John Revnolds [UKRIGS] lunch, entertained delegates with 'The Educational Potential of Local Sites'. This assumed that listeners had experienced school and fieldwork! He also spoke about linking conservation and fieldwork networks, as in the UKRIGS Education Project. Rachel Hackett [The Wildlife Trusts] in 'The Current Status of Local Wildlife Systems' highlighted familiar problems of landowners, regional variations and group viability, problems echoed by Jonathan Larwood [Natural England] in 'Local Geological Site Conservation Review Project'.

The workshops covered much useful ground, common to both Geological and Wildlife Conservation. Site Records and Information [Nicky Court, Hants Biodiversity], Practitioner Collaboration [Jonathan Larwood, Natural England], Promoting education and community involvement [Cynthia Burek, UKRIGS], Making Systems Work [Rachel Hackett, The Wildlife Trusts].

All concerned felt that it was a worthwhile seminar, which could be reconvened at a later date to report on progress. The geologists among us felt that we had given a good account of our side of nature conservation!
