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EDITORIAL

Dear Colleagues,

I would like to wish you a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year. As we approach 2007, I feel that we have reached a significant point in RIGS history. This year we have seen an increase in the number of LGAPs being produced, either led or supported by RIGS groups and the first conference on the history of Geoconservation has been held. This must show that we have reached maturity as we have a history! The Geological Society of London will publish the proceedings in 2008. I have now given my inaugural address entitled "Why conserve rocks? Geoconservation explained" which seems also to have put Geoconservation and RIGS on the map. The term "Geodiversity underpins biodiversity", which I first coined in 2000 for a university student exam and published in Earth Heritage in 2001, seems to have become a common phrase. This is gratifying as it links the two nature conservation concepts together. Local sites and PPS9 now incorporate Geodiversity, and understanding of the terms is spreading amongst practitioners. Indeed two professional institutes, IEEM and IEMA, have both had or requested workshops for their members. All this is to the good. As the first discussions on the need for a National GAP have taken place with a further meeting to take place in Chester on

19th March 2007 we reach the national agenda level. Sites will always need to be RIGGED but I think we have now reached a different playing field. Climate change is certainly pushing the political agenda and I think there is mileage to be made for geodiversity here. I hope you have a good break,

UKRIGS Education Project Update: Earth Science On-Site

Work on the Project continues, with the help of local RIGS Groups and ESTA members. The conference season in September was busy. Tedbury Camp and Vallis Vale (Somerset) materials were on display at the ESTA Conference in Bristol, with reports and an on-site fieldwork session. Barrow Hill (Dudley) was visited, and full reports given as part of the UKRIGS Conference. The Ercall KS2 materials are now on the website. We visited Meldon Aplite Quarry in early November where Kevin Page and the Devon RIGS Group introduced us to not only the geology but to the enthusiastic education staff from Dartmoor National Park. Our final field session was another visit to Ryton Pools, hosted by Martyn Bradley of the Warwickshire Geological Conservation Group. They are doing sterling work maintaining access to sands and till. On the website, the separation of the Earth Science On-Site materials from the main UKRIGS web-pages has enabled usage to be accurately logged. UKRIGS Web Updates

New additions to the website since August include: the "Earth Science On-site" resource for school teachers (esos.ukrigs.org.uk), an e-mail discussion forum for member groups of UKRIGS (email me if you are a UKRIGS member and want to ioin in webmaster@ukrigs.org.uk) and Google Analytics, a tool for monitoring who visits which areas of the website. Current results from Google Analytics shows that the main UKRIGS web-pages are visited by a select group, mostly from the UK (80%), the USA, Canada and Europe. The five most popular sections of Earth Science On-Site, are Park Hall Country Park in Staffs, The Ercall in Shropshire, Black Rock in Derbyshire, Tedbury Camp in Somerset, and the National Stone Centre in Derbyshire. Visitors to Earth Science On-Site are mainly based in the UK and Ireland (83%) while others come from all across North America, Canada, Australia, Europe, Africa and China!

NATIONAL NEWS

National Trust Geology Policy

The National Trust has for sometime been aware that it has not always acknowledged or promoted the significance of its geological resource or clearly set out a policy on its conservation. Therefore, two draft National Trust polices are currently being drawn up, in collaboration with UKRIGS, the GA and the Geoconservation Commission: a Geology Policy and a Collecting Policy. These formalise and bring together what has been previously discussed and produced in a number of papers and reports. One interesting question asked in the collaboration is "Should we be selling geological specimens from Trust land in Trust shops?". We await the final document with interest. Local Sites Guidance

A DEFRA led seminar called "Taking Forward the Guidance" is planned for Thursday 25 January 2007 at the Birmingham Hippodrome. UKRIGS has a full representation, together with geological and wildlife groups and planners. Natural England helped to shape the agenda and ensure that RIGS groups present and run workshops. There may still be some 'spare' places.

National GAP?

A meeting in Chester on 5th October, attended by representatives from England, N.Ireland, Scotland and Wales, explored the appropriateness of an NGAP. The initial outcome was positive, and the NGAP idea may be discussed further with groups developing LGAPs. Progress of this idea will be tracked with interest, to the next meeting in March 2007.





Geodiversity Good Practise

Dudley Metropolitan Borough Council have produced a document which shows the way by which we can bring geodiversity onto a par with biodiversity and archaeology, in terms of the time, money and recognition given to it by authorities. It is called "The UKRIGS local Geoconservation Association: Draft Supplementary Planning Guidance for Nature Conservation-Geodiversity and Development in The United Kingdom." Go to www.ukrigs.org.uk, click on Downloads, and look under the Public Downloads section. This is quite the best geodiversity conservation statement I have ever seen and goes much further than the much-publicised PPS9. It must surely be a candidate for national adoption. It is clear, well structured and incisive. It asks for no more than is standard practice elsewhere. Why do geologists put up with second-class status?

Natural England Progress

Natural England is settling down, but has a very target led approach and geology does not feature highly in the major corporate targets. The profile of geology is currently lower than it was in English Nature. We may need to petition harder to get things done.

Soil Protection Strategy

In September, the European Commission published "The European Thematic Strategy For Soil Protection", one of seven thematic strategies presented by the European Commission. Other strategies cover waste prevention and recycling, air pollution, the marine environment, natural resources, the urban environment and pesticides. The Strategy for Soil Protection includes a draft framework directive for soil protection, and a soil strategy and monitoring framework. For more information and to download the strategy, go to

North East Wales RIGS has been awarded four grants not one as implied earlier. These are from: the Aggregates Levy Sustainability Fund for Wales, Clwydian Range AONB Sustainability Fund, the Countryside Council for Wales, and Tarmac. (This is an amendment to the previous announcement.)

Berkshire RIGS Group

A large number of sarsons stones have been discovered

in a farmer's field in Peasmore in Berkshire. To avoid damage to his plough, the farmer dug up the stones and piled them at the edge of his field by a public footpath. Berkshire RIGS group are involved in investigating the possibility of this being a man-made stone circle.

Black Country Geological Society

The autumn celebrations of the 50th Anniversary of Wren's Nest National Nature Reserve, were extremely enjoyable and successful. The Wren's Nest Conference in early September was a geological master class, with fourteen speakers giving short presentations on various aspects of the Wren's Nest, and emphasising the international importance of this small area of the Black Country. Then, society members helped at the family Rock and Fossil Fair, which was extensively covered in the local press, raising public awareness. The canal trip underground, celebrated not only the National Nature Reserve, but also the fame of the Wren's Nest in the Victorian scientific world. The anniversary celebrations ended with 'The History of Geoconservation conference' at Dudley Museum and Art Gallery in November. This has been a very busy year, celebrating a wonderful heritage and resource. Bill Groves.



Greater London Vernon Marks

Major steps forward have been taken in London geoconservation! The Greater London Plan, "Spatial Development Strategy for Greater London", states that the Mayor will work with partners to ensure the protection and promotion of geodiversity, and that London boroughs should give strong protection to RIGS, and identify and protect additional sites of value at a local level. This plan emerged from a meeting about PPS9 in 2005 between the Greater London Authority and interested geodiversity parties. We are very pleased with how this work has proceeded and the positive attitude shown by the GLA to geoconservation. A continuation meeting is being held shortly to see how this work can be taken forward as a partnership.

Somerset Geology Group

Temporary geological exposures give a unique and short-lived insight into our subterranean world, and need to be taken advantage of quickly. Earlier this year, Somerset Geology Group took such an opportunity, when the National Grid laid a natural gas pipeline from llchester to Barrington. They logged an 8-mile stretch through an almost continuous section of clay vale type land, collected a number of ammonites and discovered some previously unrecorded faults. This adds to the group's notes made over 45 years of pipeline and road works, building up a detailed knowledge of the stratigraphy and structure of the area. BGS now has a copy of this report.

South London RIGS

A "London Geodiversity Partnership" has been set up to prepare an Audit document of geodiversity in London. It will give an overview of London's geology, with a detailed list of Geological SSSI's, RIGS and LIGS in a similar manner to the BGS Durham Geodiversity Audit, but with more detail about the individual sites. BGS will manage the project, which is a fully paid professional study with RIGS input.

South Yorkshire RIGS Group

Calling all members – past, present and future! Our last official meeting was five years ago and members have since, drifted away. The South Yorkshire region desperately needs its passionate and professional RIGS group back again. Geology and geoconservation have almost disappeared off the local authority's agenda! Help is needed for it to regain the recognition it deserves. We need an LGAP, and people to advise, and pressure the local authorities about conserving sites of interest and importance, before it is too late.
