Muirton's Buzzing

A massive 97% (over 3,000,000 hectares) of flower-rich grassland has been lost in the UK since World War Two. These flower rich areas are vital habitat for wild bees, butterflies and other insects to nest and feed.

80% of plants need insects for pollination and without these plants we would not have the air we breathe and the food we eat.

Buglife has joined forces with Perth and Kinross Council to transform areas of Muirton into colourful and wildlife-rich wildflower meadows. These wildflower meadows will benefit a whole range of invertebrates as well as many other wildlife species.

A nectar rich wildflower seed mix has been sown at the project site in Muirton and includes species that are of known Scottish origin. So far, Large white butterfly (*Pieris napi*), Marmalade hoverfly (*Epysyrphus balteatus*), Common carder bee (Bombus pascuorum) and many other species have been observed enjoying the wildflowers.
