

Whale & Dolphin Watching on the Angus Coast



If you walk the Angus coastline regularly you may be lucky enough to see a bottlenose dolphin, harbour porpoise or even a minke whale. Other species such as common dolphin, orca and humpback whale have also been spotted but are less common.

You can report your sightings on the Marine Life Angus sightings website www.marinelifeangus.co.uk The website also promotes the beautiful coastal areas of Angus which are in turn perfect for land based whale and dolphin watching opportunities.

Sharing any sightings helps us learn more about the whales and dolphins in our waters. A project called the Angus Cetacean Awareness Project collects information about cetaceans (whales and dolphins) along the coast. The purpose of the project is to learn more about cetacean presence in Angus waters aiding in future conservation.



What can I see on the Angus Coast?

Tayside Biodiversity Priority Species – some of the most frequently seen species Bottlenose Dolphin • Harbour Porpoise • Minke Whale


Scottish Biodiversity Priority Species – less frequent or rare visitors to our waters Fin Whale • Common Dolphin • Northen Roght Whale • Long-finned Pilot Whale • Risso's Dolphin • Northen Bottlenose Whale • Killer Whale • Sperm Whale

Where to Watch

Some spots are better for viewing certain species and different behaviours. Elevated spots on headlands and in river mouths are some of the best areas. Sightings form the public have allowed us to map areas on the Angus Coast that are sightings hotspots.



What's Been Observed?

Most common species recorded, Bottlenose dolphin – 73% More sightings submitted from North Angus – 66% Most sightings were from 0-100ms from shore – 45% Most encounters were approximately 15 mins – 34% Most common behaviour was traveling – 48%

Feeding behaviours more commonly seen near river mouths and bays – 59%

Most common pod sizes are between 1 & 5 animals – 57% Calves seen on five occasions

Only two sightings are from boats & one surf board!
